Subject: Drama

The Drama Department is delighted that you are considering studying Drama and Theatre Studies at A level. In order to prepare yourself for the course, it is important that you read widely and think critically about what you read. With this in mind, please make sure you read some books from the attached reading list. To ensure you are ready to fully access the A level Syllabus you should complete the following tasks:

Task A

Find a play and learn a monologue from it.

Consider – Age & Gender

Emotional journey

Context of the character's own personal story within the text.

- 1. You will be performing the monologue to the class within the first week in September.
- 2. You should perform the monologue as if it is happening within a performance of the Play.
- 3. You should read the play in its entirety. Why do you think you need to do this?
- 4. It should be longer than 2 minutes in length.
- 5. You are permitted to edit the text, as long as it still makes sense to the text and the character. E.g. too long or a line from other characters can be removed.
- 6. You do not have to do an accent.
- 7. Be brave! Challenge yourself.
- 8. DO NOT leave it until the last minute.
- 9. Record yourself doing it.
- 10. Do it in front of a mirror.

Task B

Wider research – look in to the links between Theatre and Politics. This could be how the political views of particular writers or practitioners affect their work, or how particular plays or movements express political views, or even about types of theatre which emerged in particular political contexts. Create a mind map, research collage or something interesting in response!
