Best Ever GCSE Results at The Quest

Students at The Quest produced the school's best ever set of GCSE results in 2022! Particular congratulations must go to Quest's top performer, Oumie Sey who achieved an astonishing five 9s and four 8s. Oumie said, "I'm so happy knowing that everything I've done since Year 9 has paid off. I have learnt that when you sacrifice a few things you can get to where you want to be. I have thoroughly enjoyed Quest; it has helped me to grow.

The teachers gave me



one-to-one support and this support system has got me through. My peer group have motivated each other and spurred each other on." Oumie plans to go on to study A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Physics with a view to studying medicine in the future.

Quest's students have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic disruptions of the last few years. The excellent grades achieved by the overwhelming majority of students mean that they have control and choice over the next steps they choose to take in their educational journey. For most, this will mean continuing their 7-year journey into Quest6, the academy's Sixth Form.

Hephzibah Aderinwale achieved an impressive two 9s, two 8s, and three 7s. When asked about her time at Quest, Hephzibah said, "Honestly, I

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did better than I expected! It's my teachers that have got me here. They want the grades as much as we do." She is going on to study A Levels in Sociology, Maths and History.

Noreen Khawaja achieved a 9, five 8s and two 7s and now wants to study A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Psychology. Noreen said, "I didn't realise that this would be the result - I'm delighted! I have really enjoyed my time here and I am so grateful to the teachers and thank them from the bottom of my heart. Year 11 was tough but the teachers helped us through."

Sheryl Boaitey also deserves a mention having achieved five 8s,

two 7s and two 6s and is now looking forward to studying A Levels in Biology, Chemistry and Maths before training in medicine to become a surgeon. She said, "I'm happy with these results. For students who achieved 5 grade 4 GCSEs including English and


Maths, we have courses you could join at BTEC Level 3. If you have achieved GCSE grade 6 or higher you could be eligible to join one of our A Level courses.

That's the best way I can describe it. I've enjoyed myself a lot and I've achieved a lot too. I definitely want to thank the teachers because they really made sure you felt a personal connection and were getting looked after. It wasn't that they just came and did the lessons and went. They really made sure you understood everything."

Nabiha Akhtar, who studied Biology, Psychology and Chemistry is going to take a gap year to get more medical work experience before applying to study Medicine. "All the teachers have been so supportive and always went out of their way to help us. I'd say to younger students that they mustn't waste Year 12! Don't waste your free periods! In Year 13, you literally have no time, so the earlier the better. Get stuck in from the beginning!"

Having had a tough time in Year 12, Sadiya Noor over-shot her highest expectations with ABB in Politics, RS and Sociology. She said, "I wasn't expecting such good results! I did so much better than I thought so I'm going to take some time now to think about what I want to do. I've really loved it here. I love my teachers they all supported me so much. I had a very tough time in Year 12 and missed a lot of days but when I came back, I got all the support I needed and I felt so comfortable.


